testament	evidence of a believed fact

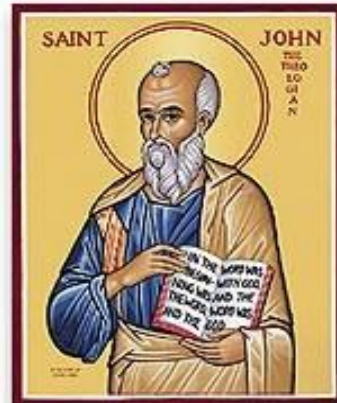
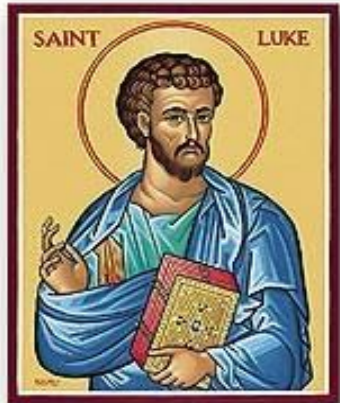
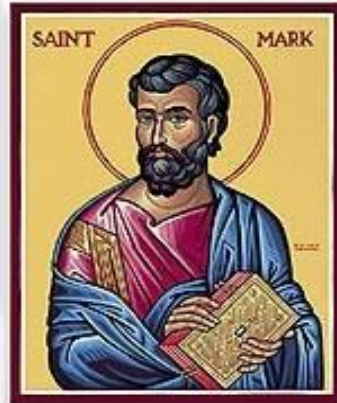
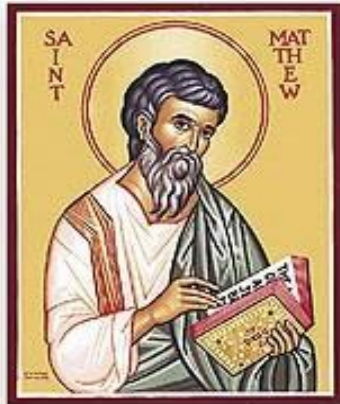
Key questions:
